2017, a Principal's Perspective

A quote about the environment but worthy of broader consideration. With the appointment of the new Head of Primary, Mr Michael Bolan, it was important to reflect on the significant contributions of past leaders but very important to look at what insights and directions lay ahead. It is a timely reminder to us all that all we do in schools is an investment in the future of the children in our care and also an investment in those that who pass through our schools in future.

Leadership is concerned with the building on strengths already present, introducing new strong initiatives and laying the foundations for future growth. Under the leadership of Mr Bolan and the newly appointed Curriculum Coordinator, Ms Liana Luyt 2017 we saw a raft of operational, curriculum and pastoral care changes and revisions.

In a school of consistently strong scores as evidenced by the standardised testing of NAPLAN, an area of identified progress was spelling. Whilst results were strong when compared with national and state averages; they showed the least growth. A collaborative and detailed process of assessing common practices, resources and programs was undertaken in conjunction with looking at current trends and research. A consistent, sequential implementation of synthetic phonics supported by a consistent program was implemented. Pre and postimplementation data was gathered and over the period of 9 months growth was demonstrated in all year groups.

The focus on STEM subjects also came into sharp focus over this period. The introduction of the STEM club, supported by resources donated by the Beechboro Parent Committee has seen the growth in

engagement in this key area. Significant grants have been accessed for the upcoming year including a pilot program in the Early Years which will include significant training and investment in STEM.

The strength of the community continues to be a defining feature of our school. The parent surveys conducted at the end of 2017 show high levels of engagement and satisfaction with the school. The students made the most of the wonderful community-built Nature Playground funded by the School Committee as phase 1 was completed. We saw strong participation levels in all our key community events like the Bennet Springs Fair, Harmony Day and Compassion Day.

2017 saw the strengthening of ties with Ellenbrook Christian College through more joint excursions, Camps and the first inter-house swimming carnival for Beechboro Christian School which was run in conjunction with Ellenbrook Christian College. The secondary school students from Ellenbrook Christian College were responsible for an interactive, outrageously fun and educational Science Fair, an event that we would look to make a regular installation.

New facilities to be celebrated were the new Nature Playground in the Early Learning area and the redevelopment of their water play area.

2017 has been a year of growth, planning and direction setting. The groundwork has been laid for the Spirit of Excellence, the articulation of the strategic direction of the school and we look forward to the next phase of this process.

NAPLAN

Comparisons of Beechboro Christian School to West Australian and National Averages

At Beechboro Christian School, all students in Year 3 and 5 sit the NAPLAN tests in Term 2, unless parents officially request to withdraw their child from the testing. In 2017, one student was withdrawn or exempted from the tests.

Teachers spend some time preparing the students for the tests as they are very different to the regular classroom style of assessing in the Primary. However, teachers are encouraged not to 'teach to the test', or to make this a big focus, but rather to continue to deliver a comprehensive and varied curriculum. In 2017 Beechboro Christian School achieved good results overall in the Year 3 and Year 5 cohorts. Scores were above the national average in all areas.

Over the years we have placed a very strong emphasis on providing parents with avenues for feedback. Schools seek feedback formally through open parent meetings, surveys and Liaison Parents. We are very grateful for the positive response to the surveys conducted at the end of 2017. Your feedback provides great insight into your view of what we are doing well and how we might better serve the needs of our community.

We had a very positive completion rate for the survey, giving a substantial body of data to work with. To honour the feedback and for the benefit of the broader community, I will summarise some key themes from the survey.

The survey highlighted many positive aspects from which the school can take great confidence. Parents showed a great appreciation and gratitude toward the loving and caring nature of our school as well as the excellent communication between the school and parents. It was clear from the feedback that parents feel that their children are very safe at school.

In the key areas of parent satisfaction, Pastoral Care, Academics, Extra- Curricular, Sense of Community and Christian Education, Beechboro Christian School ranked high. In the area of Student Focus, the feedback once again was very positive, with one trend emerging, a desire for more feedback on student progress.

Across 2017, we placed strong emphasis on creating feedback opportunities. This included our initial teacher meetings, Parent Teacher interviews in Terms 1 and 3 as well as the formal reporting in Terms 2 and 4. The school will be looking at what possibilities exist for more regular informal opportunities to view childrens progress. This may include greater use of applications such as SeeSaw, which has been well received by many parents.

Staff and School Life received very humbling and positive feedback, which I'll share openly with the Teachers and Operational staff. The unique nature of our beautiful school, characterised by compassion, care and individual attention we value is something that is clearly valued by our parent body.

We are grateful for the corporate parent support and as well as individual parent responses. We are determined to continue to work closely with our community as we strive to always provide the best possible outcome for every student and family.

As is common in any survey with free-form comments, individual issues can come through that do not fit a theme but are representative of an individual's experience or perception. If parents ever have concerns, broader questions and feedback to give, the school would value conversations with families. Do not hesitate to raise questions with the appropriate person in the school. Accurate information is a valuable resource and our goal always to plan in the best interests of our students.
